Welcome to our first edition of NOMC Rhythms! It's hard to believe that the New Orleans Musicians' Clinic is now in its 4th year of operation or that we have had more than 700 individual musician patients! Since our opening in 1998, our dedicated consortium of service providers and music community resources continue to empower and enhance our NOMC mission—to provide access to primary and preventative health services, addressing the total needs of the musician: body, mind, and spirit.

In the month of July the NOMC was able to secure funding from the LSU Biomedical Research Fund through the generous support of Pfizer Inc and Pfizer Foundation for \$100,000 over two years to Improve Healthcare Access and Outcomes in the New Orleans music community. This has allowed me the opportunity to become the NOMC's first full time paid employee and the first NOMC Administrative Director. During these challenging times, each of us questions our priorities, music's healing power continues to be an inspiration and source of comfort.

Our conviction is stronger than ever to provide wellness and promote prevention in our community. The NOMC has been featured in numerous articles all over the country, and is spotlighted in a segment for the Discovery Science Network to air in January 2002.

the nome challenge

"Since September II so many of our local musicians are offering to do benefits for others, yet they are having many of their own paying gigs canceled," explains Bethany Bultman, Chairman of NOMC Outreach Activities. "It is heartening that the grassroots support for our musicians' health services continues. Just recently it was reported that the tourist industry in Louisiana was down \$150 million. This is catastrophic to those who make their livings entertaining guests to our city."

Just recently the family of the late, great Rusty Kershaw, Louisiana-born guitarist and recording artist, approached NOMC about setting up a memorial fund to donate a percentage of the publishing rights to his songs to help support needy musicians. We hope that other musicians and record labels will allocate percentages of songs and albums to the NOMC.

This year, our dedicated group of NOMC volunteers have decided that instead of mounting another NOMC gala event, we'd launch our first direct mail appeal in response to the generous grant recently received from Pfizer Inc and the Pfizer Foundation. Thanks to our friends at Pfizer and the Foundation for the LSU Health Sciences Center, NOMC will receive \$100,000 over two years to support healthcare access and outcomes—making this one of our largest single gifts received to date.

"I was delighted to hear about the Pfizer grant," said Joel Sellers, President of the Board of the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Foundation. "Their gift is most generous, and I feel it is important for us to demonstrate to Pfizer and other potential donors that NOMC continues to grow philanthropic support to expand our many services. I would like to issue a challenge to all of our supporters—individuals, corporations and foundations—to work together to match the Pfizer grant."

The New Orleans Musicians' Clinic (NOMC) is not only the first of its kind to offer comprehensive medical services and occupational research for musicians, but it is also a unique collaboration of many not-for-profit, mission-driven institutions and organizations. In addition to serving musicians, NOMC works with the musician patients to affect an agenda of health and wellness, which reaches beyond the musician population through health screenings, concerts, and media advertisements. With these outreach programs, NOMC reaches both the musicians and their vast audiences, which ultimately reach a larger population regarding health and wellness issues.

To compliment, not compete, with fellow non-profits, NOMC has sought support through philanthropic innovation. Our first fundraising project was to produce the critically acclaimed, Grammynominated CD, Get You A Healin'. Dr. John, Irma Thomas, Allen Toussaint and more than 100 other artists created funky, jazzy, health-related songs with 100% of the proceeds going to NOMC for patient care. The song "Look What I Got" was recently licensed for an independent film, The Photographer.

"We are grateful for all of the support we receive, both in-kind and financially from individuals, foundations and corporations. This partnership between the business, philanthropic and medical communities makes improving health care access and outcomes in the New Orleans music community possible," said Johann Bultman, co-founder and managing director of NOMC. "As tourism is New Orleans' No.1 industry, and our music is the backbone of tourism, many funders see helping us treat musicians as a win-win proposition!"

The Palm Court, the Howlin' Wolf, and Fritzels regularly host concerts to support the wellness of both their musicians and all the NOMC patients. At Jazz Fest 2000, an internationally noted silk screen printer, Rick Roth of Mirror Image in Pawtucket, R.I. was so impressed by what he heard about the NOMC that he decided to create a source of revenue for us. With just a few phone calls, Roth obtained support from Hanes to donate thousands of t-shirts. The owner of Tower Records, Michael Solomon, stepped forward without hesitation to offer some of his renowned photographs as the artwork for the shirts. The t-shirts are on sale through Tower Records, with 100% of the proceeds donated to NOMC.

NOME DENTAL CARE NOW AVAILABLE THROUGH THE LSU SCHOOL OF DENTISTRY

NOMC/LSU School of Dentistry services have been made available for NOMC patients through grants from the Pierre Fourchard Foundation, Orthodontic of America, Musicares and The Sweet Relief Foundation. As part of the NOMC mission, we strive to keep musicians smilin', and that means including dental services as part of our overall wellness program. Seriously, Bunk Johnson, legendary jazz horn player and mentor of Louis Armstrong, lost his career when he lost his teeth. It is an occupational risk faced by all horn players and singers. Consider these startling statistics: Employed adults lose more than 164 million hours of work each year due to dental disease or dental visits.

Recent research has also pointed to possible associations between chronic oral infections and diabetes, heart and lung disease, stroke, and premature and low-birth-weight births.

Let's face it, dental care has long been associated with pain. However, things have changed. The improved technology now available in dentistry can help make the experience painless while transforming your smile. NOME MUSICIANS' HEALTH NOTES

Flu shots are now available to NOMC patients for \$5 thru March 1. To receive the vaccine, please call the Musicians' Patient Line, 412-1111, to ask for your "nurse only" appointment for a flu shot. Influenza, commonly called "the flu" is an infection of the respiratory tract caused by the influenza virus. Symptoms include fever of 100-103F, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, headache, muscle aches, and often extreme fatigue. Some people develop life-threatening complications such as pneumonia. Much of the illness can be prevented by annual flu shot. It is specifically recommended for people over the age of 50 with chronic diseases of the heart, lung or kidneys, diabetes, immunosuppression, or severe forms of anemia. Flu season usually occurs from about November until April, with activity peaking between late December and early March. Incubation period for the flu is from to 4 days. You can spread the flu from the day before to about five days after your symptoms appear. Influenza vaccine cannot cause the flu (which is a common misconception), but it does take about 2 weeks after you get your flu shot for your immune system to combat the flu.
